## Film Festival on Urban and Peri-Urban Agriculture

#### Introduction

In addition to the paper and poster presentations, lectures and discussions during the Tropentag, we are also using film to convey information about a central aspect of this year's theme: urban and peri-urban agriculture. Films not only document activities in visual form; they also provide an opportunity for the people involved to express their own views about what they are doing, their problems, their feelings, their dreams. Using multiple dimensions of images, language and music, films bring information in a compressed and vivid way – and also engage the multiple senses of the audience. In agricultural research and development (ARD), films are increasingly being used as a learning tool as well as a means to stimulate and strengthen partnerships between scientists, rural advisors and local communities. The role of the filmmaker with her/his technical expertise, creativity and sense of aesthetics can be to make the messages more lively and clearer, but also to support the partners in ARD to express themselves in words and actions. This comes through most strongly in the use of participatory video as a tool for community-led change. This minifestival tries to give you a taste of how film has been used in documenting, encouraging and supporting urban and peri-urban agriculture in the South (Africa, Asia and Latin America) and the North (Europe).

## Urban agriculture, Part I: Introduction to urban agriculture; Part II: From awareness to action, ETC–RUAF, 2001, 44:29 min.

This video was produced to facilitate a greater understanding of urban agriculture among policymakers, urban planners, non-governmental organisations (NGOs), sectoral organisations and other people who can contribute to the integration of urban agriculture into urban policies, plans and development programmes.

## Small urban producers organizations: key partners for sustainable development, FAO / ETC / IPES / IDRC (produced by World Report Foundation), 2006, 13:30 min.

This video advocates and analyses the specific support to be provided to (peri-)urban farmer organisations by governments, civil society organisations and international organisations, respectively. It draws on four case studies from Amsterdam (the Netherlands), Dakar (Senegal), Hyderabad (India) and Rosario (Argentina).

## Aquaculture in Action – A hidden harvest growing aquatic plants in 4 Southeast Asian cities

(Bangkok, Hanoi, HCMC & Phnom Penh), European Union / RUAF Foundation, 2006, 28:23 min. This video, produced by the PAPUSSA (Production in Aquatic Peri-urban Systems in Southeast Asia) project, describes the considerable value and impact of growing edible aquatic plants in the four cities. It shows the production cycle from pond/field, through harvesting, processing and marketing to the urban consumers, highlighting the benefits in employment and income generation, particularly for lower-income peri-urban households, while also often using and recycling urban wastewater as a readily available source of nutrients. Future constraints and increasing pressures from urbanisation are also discussed in relation to the many peri-urban dwellers whose livelihoods depend on growing aquatic plants.

#### Animals in the city, FORWARD Film Production, for ESDU/AUB, 2004, 14:53 min.

This video, produced by the Environment and Sustainable Development Unit (ESDU) of the American University of Beirut (AUB), tackles the very sensitive issue of raising animals in the city. Policymakers often regard livestock as a nuisance rather than an economic opportunity, yet animal husbandry remains important for the livelihoods of many households in urban areas.

This documentary film is a live witness of Arab Khaldeh families raising sheep in the suburbs of Beirut, the capital of Lebanon, showing how rural households have integrated themselves and their livestock into city life.

## Gardens in South Africa, filmed by members of three community garden initiatives, facilitated and produced by InsightShare, 2008, 3:51 min.

This participatory video was filmed, planned and edited by people living in Inanda Township, Durban, South Africa. This refreshingly clear and authentic short film introduces some of the people involved and reveals the motivation and passion behind three community garden initiatives in and around the township. It was one of several short films that came out of a 2-week training in participatory video (PV) run by InsightShare and supported by a local NGO partner, The Valley Trust. This eventually led to the establishment of a long-term community PV hub in Durban, run by and for the community, called *Bambumlilo* (Zulu for "Catch the fire").

#### *Tuesday,* 19:00 – 20:00 Film presentation and discussion with filmmaker Teresa Beck

#### Speaking gardens: the Berlin urban gardening movement – Teresa Beck – 2013 – 35 min.

The documentary presents seven urban gardening projects in Berlin (community gardens, intercultural gardens, roof gardens, also "guerrilla gardening"). The film focuses on the personal view of the urban gardeners, their visions as well as their concrete projects experimenting with a new way of "alternative" city planning. The citizens would like to change their cities in order to make them greener, to cultivate their own food and to work in intercultural communities. Besides the social aspect, they are also encouraged by political commitment, which in the long run aims at developing new concepts of urban life. The filmmaker wishes to raise awareness about the gardeners' commitment and the possibility of civic participation in towns.

## *Wednesday, 18.09. -* 12:30 – 14:00 Film presentation and discussion with Klaus Gräff, founder of Transition Town Initiative Tübingen-Rottenburg

#### Voices of transition – Nils Aguilar – 2006 – 65 min.

By focusing on immediate profit and ignoring millennia of experience in agronomy, agro-industry is responsible for the unprecedented erosion of soils now occurring around the world. Add climate change and dwindling natural resources to the picture, and it appears that even societies in the Global North are no longer safe from famines. *Voices of Transition* is optimistic but clearsighted. It reveals that these current and impending crises are, in fact, positive challenges! In England, the Transition Towns movement is developing at an astonishing pace. It shows that food production must not be solely in the hands of rural farmers (or faceless corporations), but that we can bring it into the very heart of cities. City-dwellers are no longer mere consumers, but instead play a vital part in the transformation of their communities towards local resilience.

#### Wednesday, 18:45 – 19:30 Film presentation and discussion with filmmaker Ella von der Haide

#### Another world is plantable! Part 1: Buenos Aires – Ella von der Haide – 2003 – 25 min.

Military dictatorship, neoliberalism and the economic crisis of 2001 have all left their mark on Argentine society. The garden initiatives in the densely populated heart of Buenos Aires are part of a societal development that has arisen beyond the confines of the state and that seeks grass-roots democratic alternatives. The community gardens respond to human needs not only materially through the production of ecological food, but also help to rebuild the social safety net and actively to bring into being political and economic utopias. In the film, gardeners from two garden projects relate their political aims and ideas as well as their experiences in their daily work with plants. The first project is MTD (Movement of Unemployed Workers) Claypole; the second is the Asamblea (Neighbourhood Initiative) La Bocca.
